



## **Worship Service Theme: All Saints Day (day after Halloween)**

### **Helpful elements:**

White table covering

Optional: Harvest décor: pumpkin, gourds, leaves

Optional: Day of the Dead paper banner ([papel picado](#))

**Welcome:** Welcome! It's so good to be together to celebrate faith and community today. My name is \_\_\_\_ and I'll be leading our worship time today. November 1 is the celebration of **All Saints Day**, established in the 9<sup>th</sup> century, a day that honors and gives thanks for past saints, known or unknown. (Some churches celebrate this day on the first Sunday after Pentecost.)

In Irish and Scottish culture, the festival of Samhain (pronounced sow-INN) celebrates the end of the harvest season. In Latin America, people celebrate *Día de los Muertos* (Day of the Dead) to honor and remember their ancestors. Both consider it a time when the veils between this world and the Otherworld are at their thinnest: when the spirits of the dead most readily mingle with the living once again.

Later, Christians adopted and celebrated these festivals as All Hallows' Eve—what we now call Halloween—followed by All Saints Day, which retains elements of remembering and honoring the dead.<sup>1</sup>

Please pray with me as we open our time together.

**Opening Prayer:** Great and loving God, we ask your Holy Spirit to bless our time together and to refresh us with your presence. In the midst of a world full of trouble and strife, we thank you for watching over us, guiding us, and as we confess our sins, for forgiving us. Enable us to enter your presence joyfully and reverently, and let us depart today with the assurance that our sins are forgiven. Fill us, O God, with the peace which passes understanding. Amen.

## **Opening Hymn: Doxology**

**Statement of Faith:** Let us affirm our statement of faith by reciting Psalm 23 together:

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.

<sup>2</sup> He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters.

<sup>3</sup> He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

<sup>4</sup> Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me.

<sup>5</sup> Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over.

**Second reading:** Matthew 5:3-11. This is the first part of Jesus' famous Sermon on the Mount.

<sup>4</sup> "Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted.

<sup>5</sup> "Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth.

<sup>6</sup> "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied.

<sup>7</sup> "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy.

<sup>8</sup> "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God.

<sup>9</sup> "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God.

**Interactive Homily:** Let's think a little more about All Saints Day, which is traditionally the day after Halloween.

- How would you define a saint?
  - *Saint*: from the Latin word *sanctus*, or set apart, made holy
  - An especially holy person, close to God and displaying godly character
  - Original Christian meaning: *any* believer in whom Christ dwells, whether in Heaven or on Earth
  - In many traditions, saints are all faithful deceased in heaven (some worthy of greater honor or emulation).
  - Historically, the Christian church commemorated a martyr's death with a special day; but with so many, the church eventually appointed a common day for all martyrs, and thus was born "All Saints Day."

- “Saint” can also be a title: Official “saint” recognition is given to some through canonization in the Catholic Church or glorification in the Eastern Orthodox Church.<sup>2</sup>
- Who would you call a saint in your life? Examples?
- How many of you believe you’ll be a saint one day? What do you think it takes?
- What does Jesus teach in the Beatitudes? What’s the first one?
  - Blessed are the poor in spirit – for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
- Do you think being a saint includes being in the kingdom of heaven? (Yes!) And to whom does Jesus say belongs the kingdom of heaven?
  - Poor in spirit
- What, then, does it mean to be “poor in spirit”?
  - Knowing you’re not worthy; knowing that you don’t have all the answers
  - Knowing that you’re poor in spiritual wisdom, practice, truth
  - Needy, empty
- Do we earn our worthiness to become saints? Does God owe us sainthood because of our goodness, our good works, our good heart?
  - No! God graciously bestows love and mercy on us as we seek him from our “poor in heart” state, in our neediness.
- We all struggle day by day to live lives that are holy and according to God’s ways and God’s will. And that’s good – because we NEED God to make us holy, and we SEEK God to give us what we need to have faith and to follow him. That’s what saints have always done!

Let’s take a moment to silently pray and reflect on the blessing of Christian martyrs, leaders, and everyday saints who have gone before us and loved us throughout our lives.

**(Silent Prayer)** ... Lord, hear our prayers. Now let us pray the Lord’s prayer together:

**Lord’s Prayer:** Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.
