



Worship Service Theme: Blessing

Helpful elements:

Green table covering (Ordinary Time)

Welcome: Welcome! It's so good to be together to celebrate faith and community today. My name is ____ and I'll be leading our worship time. Our theme for today is **blessing**. What do you think blessing means? *[pause for feedback]*

It turns out that blessing is all over the scriptures; in fact, it seems like one of God's most frequent actions is to bless his people, and one of God's people's most frequent actions is to bless or thank God. So today in our worship service, we'll hear more about blessing and some stories about being blessed.

Please pray with me as we open our time together.

Opening Prayer: Great and loving God, we ask your Holy Spirit to bless our time together and to refresh us with your presence. In the midst of a world full of trouble and strife, we thank you for watching over us, guiding us, and as we confess our sins, for forgiving us. Enable us to enter your presence joyfully and reverently, and let us depart today with the assurance that our sins are forgiven. Fill us, O God, with the peace which passes all understanding. Amen.

Opening Hymn: Doxology

Statement of Faith: Let us affirm our statement of faith by reciting Psalm 23, "The Lord is my shepherd," together:

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.

² He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters.

³ He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

⁴Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil:
for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me.

⁵Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou
anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over.

⁶Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell
in the house of the Lord forever.

First reading: Matthew 5:1-9, the beginning of the Sermon on the Mount:

¹When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up on a mountainside and sat down. Jesus' disciples came to him, ²and he began to teach them. Jesus said:

for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

⁴Blessed are those who mourn,
for they will be comforted.

⁵Blessed are the meek,
for they will inherit the earth.

⁶Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness,
for they will be filled.

⁷Blessed are the merciful,
for they will be shown mercy.

⁸Blessed are the pure in heart,
for they will see God.

Jesus Loves Me

Second reading: A true story about blessing, called “A Big Bag of Shoes,” by Keith Rawlinson¹

There was a woman in church who had found herself a single mother. She had very little money and was finding it difficult to provide for her children. She could no longer afford the house she was renting, so she had to move out of the house and into an apartment. Since the move was just across town, this single mother saved time by packing all their belongings into boxes and garbage bags.

The next day, after the move was complete and she had unpacked everything, she realized that the garbage bag into which she had packed her and her children’s shoes was missing. She drove back to the rental house and asked the landlord if he had seen the bag of shoes. With sincere apology, the landlord told her that he did see the bag of shoes, but since it was in a garbage bag, he assumed it was trash and had thrown it away.

The woman was devastated. Her church shoes and her work shoes, and her children’s church and shoes, were all in that bag. Now they were gone, and she couldn’t afford to replace them.

Someone at church heard about the situation, decided to be an answer to prayer, and spent their own money to replace all of the shoes the woman and her children had lost.

This is an interesting look at how God blesses us! God could have just provided this single mom with some extra money to replace the shoes; or someone could have just given her money to replace the shoes. But instead, God chose to bless her with a big bag of shoes, a creative blessing that provided exactly what she needed.

Interactive Homily: Let's think a little more about blessing. The dictionary defines blessing as a kind of *approval* or *encouragement*, either from God, us, or others.

- What kinds of blessings do we give?
 - Three times a day we bless *[pause for feedback]* ... our food!
 - We bless family, especially children and grandchildren.
 - We even bless the Lord, give thanks to God.
- What kinds of blessings have you ever received or asked for?
 - For a marriage, for a course of action, for a move far away.
 - We also ask for the Lord's blessing on certain situations: bless this trip, bless this job.
- How do you *feel* when you are "blessed"?
 - Happy!
 - But feeling blessed goes deeper than simple happiness. There's a contentment, a sense of well-being and safety, of being spiritually settled.
- Do blessings sometimes come in unexpected forms, like a big bag of shoes? I wonder if you've ever experienced a blessing that was a complete surprise? *[let people tell stories]*
 - In Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, blessings come from surprising sources:
 - Those who are poor in spirit → close to the kingdom of heaven. Jesus says that God is closest to people who feel empty and needy!
 - Meekness → inherit the earth. This sounds upside-down! But Jesus says that unlike power, humility and gentleness are the qualities that make a difference and last forever.
 - Hunger and thirst for righteousness and justice → will be filled. The struggle for justice seems never-ending; but Jesus says God's righteousness and justice will prevail.
- What do you consider ongoing blessings in your life? How have you seen God or other people bless you?
- How can we "count our blessings" every day?
 - Talk about our blessings.
 - Write down blessings we're grateful for.
 - Pay attention to blessings around you.
 - Look for the good in people and situations.

- Share with others what we're grateful for, including in them.

Let's take a moment to silently pray and reflect on our blessings and how to bless others.

(Silent Prayer) ... Lord, hear our prayers. Now let us pray the Lord's prayer together:

Lord's Prayer: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory forever, Amen.

Third Reading: Genesis 12: 1-3. This is from the very first book in the Bible. From the earliest times of God's interactions with people, God promises that as we are blessed by him, we are empowered to be a blessing to others.

¹ Now the Lord said to Abram, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. ² And I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. ³ I will bless those who bless you, ... and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed."

³ Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, ⁴ even as he chose us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before him.
