

Worship Service Theme: Discovery

Welcome: Welcome! It's so good to be together to celebrate faith and community today. My name is ____ and I'll be leading our worship time today. This week we're looking at the theme of **discovery.**

Let's look at the word itself: *dis* + *cover*, or "to uncover, to find." That's where the intersection with faith happens: through God's Spirit, we continually discover new things about God, ourselves, and the world around us.

Please pray with me as we open our time together.

Opening Prayer: Great and loving God, we ask your Holy Spirit to bless our time together and to refresh us with your presence. In the midst of a world full of trouble and strife, we thank you for watching over us, guiding us, and as we confess our sins, for forgiving us. Enable us to enter your presence joyfully and reverently, and let us depart today with the assurance that our sins are forgiven. Fill us, O God, with the peace which passes understanding. Amen.

Statement of Faith: Let us affirm our statement of faith by reciting Psalm 23 together:

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.

First reading: A Brief History of Discovery¹

This week is the anniversary of Christopher Columbus' arrival on the American Continent on October 12, 1492. The landing is celebrated as *Columbus Day* in the United States; and because Columbus was Italian, many Italian-Americans observe Columbus Day as a celebration of their heritage.

But some things have changed as we "rediscover" the truth about our nation's beginnings ... because Columbus didn't actually discover America, did he? Who was here first? The Native Americans! There were already civilized people inhabiting this land.

To acknowledge this, several U.S. states and cities, including South Dakota, Vermont, Phoenix, and Denver, have replaced Columbus Day with *Indigenous Peoples Day*. In Latin America, it is recognized as *Día de las Culturas* (Day of Cultures), *Día de las Américas* (Day of the Americas), and *Dia del Respeto a la Diversidad Cultural* (Day of Respect for Cultural Diversity).

In 1992, the National Council of Churches said this about the start of colonization in America: "What represented newness of freedom for some was the occasion for oppression for others." Something to think about!

Second reading: Matthew 13:44-46

⁴⁴ Jesus said, "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which a man found and covered up. Then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field. ⁴⁵ "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search

of fine pearls, 46 who, on finding one pearl of great value, went and sold all that he had and bought it."

This is the word of the Lord; thanks be to God.

Interactive Homily: Let's talk more about discovery.

- What types of things have you looked for in your life?
 - o Lost child, lost valuable item; looking for a job; looking for a home
- What is it like when you're looking for something? What do you feel?
 - It can depend on what you're looking for! When you're looking for something like a job or valuable item, there can be feelings of urgency, anxiety, even fear
 - o In less urgent circumstances, looking may feel like an adventure
- What does it feel like when you find something *unexpectedly*? Like finding money on the ground or a book you've been wanting to read? How does that feel?
 - Excited, surprised, happy, grateful
- Now turning to our spiritual lives: How did you find God, or how did God find you? (Take time to tell stories here.) Examples:
 - Grew up in the church
 - o Taught by parents or grandparents or teachers
 - o Struck by the Spirit at a "tent meeting" or revival
 - o Talking to people or reading
 - o Being out in nature
 - Sometimes young, sometimes old people find God in different ways and at all stages of life!
- As we read in Matthew 13, Jesus talks about the kingdom of God in two ways:
 - As a treasure hidden in a field the person was not even looking for it!
 - As a pearl of great value a merchant is looking and finally finds the perfect pearl.
- What's the same in both stories?

- The VALUE of what is found. Both people in the stories sell everything else they have to get the treasure or pearl.
- Jesus uses these pictures to teach that the kingdom of heaven, a relationship with God, is worth more than anything else, worth more than anything you could give up to get it.
- And this treasure and pearl this relationship of great value doesn't end upon first discovery; it continues! God's Spirit calls us to discover God throughout our lives as we journey through the world. Consider these "discovery" questions for today:²
 - Why do you think you are here? (list as many ideas as possible)
 - "If you are alive, you are here for a purpose."
 - What have you enjoyed learning? What do you still enjoy learning?
 (list as many ideas as possible)
 - "Life is a learning journey. The more we learn, the more we grow... and the richer and deeper our life experience."
 - What brings you joy? (list as many ideas as possible)
 - "Often it is the simple things that bring us the most joy. Make a list of the things that bring you joy. Then begin incorporating those things into your life on a daily basis."
 - God can and will use the time we have here on Earth to show us more of who we are, what's important (and what's not!), and how we can love him and love our neighbor well.

... Let's take a moment to silently pray and reflect on God's gift of discovery.

(Silent Prayer) ... Lord, hear our prayers. Now let us pray the Lord's prayer together:

Lord's Prayer: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory forever, Amen.

Fourth Reading: Matthew 7:7-11

Jesus said: ⁷ "Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you.⁸ For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened. ⁹Which one of you, if his son asks him for bread, would give him a stone?¹⁰ Or if your child asks for a fish, would give him a serpent? ¹¹ If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to

your children, how much more will your Father who is in heaven give good things to those who ask him!"

In other words: God isn't hiding from you! God is close and looking for you as you look for him. Take time to be quiet and listen for his voice. God, as a good father, will give you what is good – especially himself.
