

Worship Service Theme: Honor (appropriate for Veterans or Remembrance Day)

Helpful elements:

Welcome: Welcome! It's so good to be together to celebrate faith and community today. My name is ____ and I'll be leading our worship time today.

Our theme for today is **honor.** In the United States and Canada, this week is the celebration of Veterans Day or Remembrance Day. The United Kingdom celebrates Armed Forces Day in June, and Australia and New Zealand recognizes their veterans on Anzac Day in April.

Who here has ever served their country either stateside or overseas? Who knows a relative or someone else who served in the armed forces? (Those two questions should include pretty much everyone!) The Bible has much to say about why we rightly honor men and women for their sacrificial service — and why it's important to honor all people as image bearers of God.

Please pray with me as we open our time together.

Opening Prayer: Great and loving God, we ask your Holy Spirit to bless our time together and to refresh us with your presence. In the midst of a world full of trouble and strife, we thank you for watching over us, guiding us, and as we confess our sins, for forgiving us. Enable us to enter your presence joyfully and reverently, and let us depart today with the assurance that our sins are forgiven. Fill us, O God, with the peace which passes understanding. Amen.

Opening Hymn: Doxology

Statement of Faith: Let us affirm our statement of faith by reciting Psalm 23, "The Lord is My Shepherd," together:

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.

- ² He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters.
- ³ He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.
- ⁴Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me.
- ⁵Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over.
- ⁶ Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

First reading: Psalm 8

Jesus Loves Me

Second reading: Philippians 2:25-30

The apostle Paul (St. Paul) writes to the believers in Philippi about one of his brothers in Christ and why this brother should be honored. Paul writes:

²⁵ I have thought it necessary to send to you Epaphroditus my brother and fellow worker and fellow soldier, and your messenger and minister to my need, ²⁶ for he has been longing for you all and has been distressed because you heard that he was ill. ²⁷ Indeed he was ill, near to death. But God had mercy on him, and not only on him but on me also, lest I should have sorrow upon sorrow. ²⁸ I am the more eager to send him, therefore, that you may rejoice at seeing him again, and that I may be less anxious. ²⁹ So receive him in the Lord with all joy, and honor such men, ³⁰ for he nearly died for the work of Christ...

Interactive Homily: Let's think a little more about honor.

- How would you define honor?
 - o High esteem; respect; good reputation
 - A title given as a distinction ("served with high honor," "graduated with honors")
 - Pay public respect to
 - A personal quality we use as a promise ("on my honor"—see U.S. Boy Scout and Girl Scout pledges, last page)
- What sorts of people do we honor?
 - Parents: "honor your mother and father" (Exodus 20:12). This is the only one of the Ten Commandments that includes a promise: "That you may live long in the land that the Lord your God is giving you."
 - o Teachers: We call them sir, ma'am, professor, doctor, Mr., Mrs.

- People in authority. Does that mean you always agree with your leaders? No! But respect them even in disagreement; don't stoop to name-calling or insults.
- Military, police, emergency responders, and the like: They serve a high calling, to serve and sacrifice for their country's principles, sometimes even giving their lives.
- Why do we honor these people?
 - Selflessness
 - Sacrifice
 - o Even more profound: They are made in God's image
- Why do we sometimes forget to honor people like veterans?
 - They are too familiar it's easy to take them for granted, forget they are there, forget what they have done, treat them as ordinary or in the background.
- Who else do we forget to honor? God!
 - We sometimes treat God as common or ordinary, not as the reigning King of King and Lord of Lords.
 - But when we see God as God is, we won't see people as common or ordinary, because being God's children and bearing God's image makes people more valuable than anything else in the universe.¹
- Could a casual attitude toward God have anything to do with why we sometimes forget to honor our veterans and others?
- How can we honor our veterans and service people today?
 - o Say "thank you!" Acknowledge their choice to serve as honorable.
 - Consider supporting organizations that are dedicated to veterans, such as:
 - <u>Canine Companions</u>, which trains and provides service dogs for vets (and others) at no cost.
 - Wounded Warriors Family Support, which "provides, free of charge, family-friendly retreats where wounded veterans, spouses, and children can reconnect with each other in a lowstress setting."
 - Homes for Our Troops, which builds mortgage-free and specially adapted houses for multiple amputees and veterans with traumatic brain injuries."

Fourth Reading: A story about George Washington and honor²
After the U.S. Revolutionary War, an officer wrote General George Washington with the suggestion that Washington should become King of America.
Washington wrote back: "[If] you have any regard for your country—concern for yourself or posterity—or respect for me, banish these thoughts from your mind, and never communicate [them], as from yourself, or anyone else." In refusing to become king, Washington was more concerned with his country than his own glorification. That attitude is why he deserves honor to this day.

[optional reading:] The respect George Washington earned helped the new United States again shortly after the Revolutionary War, when the Continental Congress did not pay the army and former soldiers threatened to revolt. Washington met with the leaders of the offended group, and as he was about to beg them to show restraint, he paused and took a pair of eyeglasses from his pocket. The soldiers had never seen Washington use eyeglasses before. Addressing the soldiers again, Washington began: "Gentlemen, you must pardon me. I have grown gray in your service, and now find myself growing blind." This
