



Worship Service Theme: Charity
Third Sunday of Lent

Helpful Elements:

Purple table covering (Lenten Season)

Welcome: Welcome! Thank you for coming to our service today. My name is _____ and I'll be leading our worship time. Today is the third Sunday of Lent, the 40 days leading up to Easter, a time of reflecting on our humanity and God's glory. We use the color purple during Lent as the color of repentance and forgiveness. Today we'll be looking at the idea of **charity**.

Please pray with me as we open our time together.

Opening Prayer: Great and loving God, we ask your Holy Spirit to bless our time together and to refresh us with your presence. In the midst of a world full of trouble and strife, we thank you for watching over us, guiding us, and as we confess our sins, for forgiving us. Enable us to enter your presence today joyfully and reverently, and let us depart with the assurance that our sins are forgiven. Fill us, O God, with the peace that passes all understanding. Amen.

Opening Hymn: Doxology

Statement of Faith: Let us affirm our statement of faith by reciting Psalm 23, "The Lord is My Shepherd" together:

¹The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.

²He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters.

³He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

⁴Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me.

⁵Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over.

⁶Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

First Reading: Matthew 6:1-4. This is part of Jesus' famous Sermon on the Mount. Jesus taught his followers:

¹“Beware of practicing your righteousness before other people in order to be seen by them, because then you will have no reward from your Father who is in heaven. ²Thus, when you give to the needy, sound no trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, that they may be praised by others. Truly, I say to you, they have received their reward. ³But when you give to the needy, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, ⁴so that your giving may be in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will reward you.”

This is the word of the Lord; thanks be to God.

Second reading: 2 Corinthians 9:6-8, 11. In his second book to the early church in Corinth, the apostle Paul writes:

⁶... Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. ⁷Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, because God loves a cheerful giver. ⁸And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that having all sufficiency in all things at all times, you may abound in every good work. ... ¹¹You will be enriched in every way to be generous in every way, which through us will produce thanksgiving to God.

This is the word of the Lord; thanks be to God.

Interactive Homily: Let's think a bit about charity.

- The word *charity* is also often translated as *love*; in the New Testament, both are the Greek word *agape*. Today, we're thinking about charity in the sense of giving to others.
 - "Charity means participating in tangible acts of loving-kindness toward all others (friend or enemy) in unconditional and self-sacrificial ways."¹
 - To practice charity means *doing*, not just speaking, acts of love, including giving.
- What kinds of things can we give to other people in need? [*generate ideas*]
 - Money, time, attention, physical care, a listening ear, a shoulder to cry on, food, shelter, employment ... etc.
- Who benefits from an act of giving?
 - The person who receives the gift
 - The person who gives! How do you feel when you give something to someone else?
 - Satisfaction, joy
 - Sharing resources also benefits society at large
- Is giving easy? What sometimes makes giving hard?
 - Worried about not having enough ourselves
 - Worried the gift might not go to "good use"
- What helps make giving easier?
 - Make giving a habit! Do it regularly, cheerfully
- What can happen to our hearts when we don't practice charity – when we hold everything tightly and are unwilling to share?
 - We can become focused only on ourselves, blind to others' needs.
 - "Without the practice of charity, [a person's] life grows stale and unfeeling, and a nation's existence becomes self-centered and insecure."²

- Giving opens our hearts and vision to the needs of others, freely sharing what God has given us. What does God give us? [*generate ideas*]
 - Life, grace, forgiveness, healing, love ... *everything*
- We are children of the King! As children of the King, do we have enough to give to others?
 - Yes! As the apostle Paul wrote, “You will be enriched in every way *to be generous in every way*, which through us will produce thanksgiving to God” (2 Cor. 9:11).
- Why does God give “enrich” us with good things?
 - *So that* we can be generous. Not to hoard! When we give cheerfully and regularly, God promises to provide all we need to continue doing good.³ That means:
 - If you give your time, you’ll find you have enough time.
 - If you give away love, you’ll find you have more love than ever.
 - The result? Thankful hearts, giving glory to God.
- Who is the ultimate Giver?
 - God! We can never out-give God.

Especially because we are in the season of Lent, a time of reflection and repentance, let us pray together to think about the gifts we’ve been given, and to consider how we can share those gifts freely and generously.

(Silent Prayer) ... Lord, hear our prayers. Now let us pray the Lord’s prayer together:

Lord’s Prayer: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory forever, Amen.
